

MOVING FORWARD

At its October meeting, our Session unanimously approved the recommendation from the Building Design Committee (BDC) to hire MCL Construction to oversee our upcoming building expansion. At the conclusion of last night's meeting, BDC Moderator, Mike Howland, exclaimed, "We are now underway!"

For the next few months, MCL and Leo A. Daly Architects will be working together to formulate a timeline for Schematic Design and Design Development. We will see their first Schematic results in December. More design will follow, as well as the lining up of sub-contractors. The real total costs will be known by next March or April. In the meantime, site surveys and geotechnical tests will commence, and architectural and civil engineering drawings will be developed.

On-site construction is planned to begin sometime next July or August, and it is projected to last about 14 months. We will know more exact details next spring.

Along the way, from time to time our parking will be affected as work trucks enter and exit, and materials are delivered and staged. There will be a period of time when part of the Fellowship Hall will be walled off, so that the area along the windows can be expanded. There will be a time when part of our narthex is also walled off, as the entrance from the new Welcome Center is completed.

We will do our best to give ample warning as our normal church life is affected and altered periodically.

Thus, an exciting, new planning stage is now underway, with more details headed our way in the year to come. It will be a challenging year ahead, where our flexibility and creativity will be called upon. I know we will be up to the task!

As all this heads our way, so do Thanksgiving and Christmas!

As we look back on "the year it's been" since this time last year, we have travelled far. We are weary. Our children and grandchildren are weary, as are our teachers and health care workers. Yes, we are looking forward to a better holiday season this year than last. Families are cautiously looking forward to reuniting. Church activities are hoping to return to normal, including our Advent Dinner.

To this extent, I call on you to aim for a truly thankful Thanksgiving Day and a truly meaningful time of preparation in Advent. Let's make these traditions count this year, living our faith with Christ at the center.

If you have experienced loss during the pandemic, you may find the November 7 Remembrance Service especially helpful and meaningful. You may need to do something different this year for Thanksgiving – supporting a family in need through purchasing a food basket. There may be special folks you want to honor and recognize through purchasing a poinsettia for the sanctuary for Advent.

It's true that the more you put into something, the more you will get out of it. I encourage you, as we move into our holiday season, to look for ways to make this year even more meaningful.

It has been a tough year all around, but together we are moving forward!

Finding Closure

As you know, I lost my mother in March of 2020 right when the COVID-19 restrictions limited human gatherings. We had only ten people at a graveside service. There was no time sitting in in the peace of a sanctuary. There was no organ. There was no extended family or long-time friends. For me, the healing process has been very slow as my heart yearns to have a space to remember her at the cross, surrounded by like-believers in the Body of Christ and listening to the music that brought her joy and comfort. I am sure that many of you have had the same experience.

COVID-19 impacted us here too, as we were unable to host funerals for several months. We had to limit the size of our remembrance services, and many had to hold services in unfamiliar places. There were no funeral lunches and no hugs, and many of us were left without closure. Of course, the loss went beyond our congregation and our city to our family and friends around the world who also experienced great loss. When we lost loved ones in different cities, we were unable to say goodbye. In this odd time, we lost important human connections that allow us to grieve and heal. Instead of remembering and celebrating the lives of our dear family and friends, we instead see the holes that are left in the absence. What if we could have a service to remember our loved ones, to be in the presence of friends and to support one another in this time of loss?



More Ways to Find PCOC — Live & On the Go

Each week our worship numbers nudge a bit closer to normal, and our other church activities are starting to regain a following. Yet, we know that for some families, now is still not the right time to return to full church life. In the continuing uncertainty of the pandemic, we are always searching for improved ways to connect our congregation with the word of God and the community of church. We've discovered there is more than Zoom!

At the beginning of October, we began to livestream our early service. For those of you watching from home at 9:00 a.m., our livestream may seem like any other service recording, but it is a bit different. The livestream starts at 8:45 a.m. with a series of church announcement slides as worshippers gather. Soft music plays during this part, so you can test that your sound and video are working before worship begins.

Whether you are on a laptop, desktop computer, tablet, phone, or TV, your device has a volume setting. Make sure the volume is set appropriately and not muted.



Connecting headphones and speakers can improve sound quality for some devices. If you connect your computer to a TV using an HDMI cord, if you use a smart TV, or if you have a streaming device for your TV (Roku stick, Amazon Fire stick, etc), your TV controls the sound volume — adjust the TV volume as needed.

The actual worship service starts just before 9 with the prelude. On the livestream screen, we'll show words to prayers and lyrics to hymns during the service, so you can fully participate. Know that when you recite the Lord's Prayer or sing along to your favorite hymn, your voice is joining a chorus of fellow church members across the city who are doing the same at that moment. It's the next best thing to being in the Sanctuary together. If you visit our website between 9 and 10 a.m., you will catch the service in progress. If you are not an early church person, no worries. A recording is archived immediately after the service is over, and you may watch it any time on our website.

On Sunday mornings, Christian Fritz (left) is controlling our video feed from the balcony and Piper Smith (right) is running our sound



system to ensure that a complete service reaches you at home.

New this fall, we are unveiling our audio podcast an abbreviated version of our Sunday worship service designed for people on the go. Each podcast features the weekly scripture, sermon, and a bit of our outstanding Church of the Cross music.

The goal of our podcast is to connect you with scripture no matter where you are. You can download episodes and listen on your smart device while driving on a trip or for your morning commute or even while spending time in the



great outdoors. You don't have to be in front of a computer or even sitting still to listen. "The Cross" the podcast from Presbyterian Church of the Cross is available on Spotify. We just released our first seven episodes, and a new episode will be available on Mondays each week, featuring the scripture, sermon, and music from the day before.

Advocating for Kids & Families

Voices for Children in Nebraska continues working to build pathways to opportunity for all kids and families through research,



advocacy and community engagement. The 2021 Legislative Session yielded several important policy victories for kids and families including:

- Addressing growing food insecurity for children through expanded access to food assistance in SNAP (food stamps). As families continue to recover from the pandemic, food insecurity rates have remained high. Legislation passed last year will ensure that families can still qualify for food assistance even after slight increases in monthly income for the next two years.
- Temporarily expanding access to affordable child care through increased eligibility for child care assistance. Families continue to sight affordable child care as a significant barrier to work. A bill passed last year will allow families with higher incomes to qualify for child care assistance for the next two years.
- Strengthening the right to an attorney for kids in our juvenile justice system statewide, which has been shown to improve outcomes for young people in our justice system.

Looking ahead, here are some possibilities on the horizon for 2022:

- Leveraging increased federal funding for child care to support the early childhood workforce.
- Expanding access to the Bridge to Independence program in order to provide supportive services to young people as they work to transition out of

the Juvenile Justice system.

• Amending the definition of child neglect to ensure that families living in poverty are offered supportive services instead of punitive measures.

The cancellation of our special event two years in a row has been challenging and we are thankful for the continued support of Presbyterian Church of the Cross during a challenging time. Serving at Siena Francis House

Siena Francis House provides nearly 400,000 meals each year. PCOC is looking for volunteers for our serving shift on Sunday, November 14 from 4:15 to 6:15 p.m. To serve, you must be registered as a volunteer on the



Siena Francis House website and sign up for one of the PCOC timeslots. To protect the safety of everyone volunteering, Siena Francis House will require that all volunteers provide either proof of vaccination or proof of a negative COVID-19 test within 72 hours of a volunteer shift. The volunteer sign up portal will ask you to upload one of these documents. If you have questions, call or email Keith Allen.

BURM General Assembly Overture

An overture for the 2022 General Assembly meeting has been developed by the Belarus, Ukraine, Russia Mission (BURM) Network and requests support from our denomination to increase education and engagement with churches in Eastern Europe. It is known as OVT-047 and was submitted by the Presbytery of Utah to PC(USA). PCOC Session members voted to speak on behalf of OVT-047 at the November meeting of the Presbytery of Missouri River Valley. The overture must gain concurrence by at least two other presbyteries to be considered at the General Assembly meeting. Because of our church's long-term relationship with our friends in Gnozdovo, Russia, Church of the Cross will be encouraging our own presbytery to be among the first to concur with OVT-047. Contact Karen Morey for more information about this effort.
