What will 2022 hold in store for us? Wouldn't a crystal ball come in handy about now? As I write this, Christmas is still a week away. All the excitement of Christmas Eve and Christmas morning still await. Right now, 2022 is still a dream, but when you read this, 2022 will have begun. Where will it take us?

Unfortunately, we enter 2022 with COVID still here, with the Ominous Omicron knocking on the door. Fortunately, we enter 2022 with vaccines and boosters, something we did not have a year ago.

A year ago, we were not able to meet in person. Our building was closed, although our church never closed. Now, we are glad to have been able to cautiously return, as well as still provide an online presence which many folks enjoy and depend on. Now, our 9:00 a.m. service is presented live online each Sunday, something that we were not doing a year ago. Our communications team continues to look to the future with plans for expanding, modernizing, and improving our efforts.

A year ago, we were still wondering how the capital campaign would develop. Today, we are developing the designs for construction to commence next summer. Many details are left to work out before ground is broken, but these details are being addressed. It is exciting to ponder where we will be a year from now when 2023 will commence!

2021 was a year in which PCOC gave more to mission than ever before. Your faithful contributions, to our budget and to outreach, were unprecedented. Our recent Stewardship Campaign ended strong. We enter 2022 financially sound, with a penchant for not only taking care our own needs, but looking to the needs of others.

A year ago, we were reading and zooming about justice issues. 2021 ended with a visit to North Omaha, and now we are learning and speaking together about just what Agape for All should, and can, mean for us.

Wendy Chapman


