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Dear friends,

I just returned from a big preaching conference in Denver, Colorado. Like conferences in all disciplines, it is a time to get together with folks in the same profession, share stories, and listen for contemporary trends. While this might seem a bit obscure for preachers (after all aren't we all just telling God's story?), it is relevant, and it is not a surprise that the trends for 2022 center around how to heal the church after a storm.

This conference, The Festival of Homiletics, has been going on for thirty years, yet the last two have been on Zoom. This year, when we finally returned to meeting in person, we realized that nothing was the same. We now inhabited a new space, with new rules, and new expectations. We came together confronted by the shared trauma of the pandemic, the rawness of yet another mass shooting, and the reality of a war that has worldwide repercussions. How are we now the church when our twenty-first century social paradigm has just taken a major shift?

The collection of preachers, seminary professors and spiritual leaders came helping us reflect on how we can move forward. As Dr. Anna Florence Carter, seminary professor at Columbia noted, "Our last two years broke the mold of the prophet's plot." Instead of a storm that leads to a calm, we seem to be living in a never-ending storm with no end in sight. Psychologist Robert Wicks said it this way, "When we experience the stress of the chronic, we don't know when to scream." Yet, as we gathered day after day in the historic churches of downtown Denver for worship and prayer, there was a communal strength and a shared hope by the many of us called to ministry. There was a renewed commitment to looking at this world, this one in perpetual trauma, and see how these eyes and experiences shape our understanding of scripture.

For me personally, this experience has reopened my eyes to the rawness of scripture and the blood of our human lives. We have honestly whitewashed our scriptures, making them clean and the messages nice and neat. But the trauma – in all its ugliness -- experienced by Jesus, the disciples and his followers take on a new intensity in this time. It is when I stop and internalize this pain that I truly realize that our faith is equipped to handle the storm of adversity. As Dr. Karoline Lewis of Luther seminary taught, "trauma is at the heart of our witness." The trauma of many of our Biblical characters was real and so is ours. But because this trauma is part of our faith, we have the language and the tools to talk about the trauma, to sit in the pain and live into hope. We know that despite the chronic nature of today's storms, that Day of Resurrection will come, that our tears will dry out, and that God's peace will be our song.

The View from My Office

LET'S BUILD IT NOW

Stepping out in faith, session has approved contractor MCL to be the contractor at risk for the new addition and renovation. Church of the Cross members have worked on this project since 2017 and I would like to offer my thanks to everyone who participated in congregational and committee meetings.

Our church continues to work together to continually challenge each other to be better stewards of the gifts God entrusts to each of us.

At the luncheon on May 1, members were informed of the cost of the project and where we stand with pledged giving. It is the objective of our Capital Campaign Committee to finance construction, if possible, on a debt-free basis.

Generous donors continually close the gap. Again, thank you!



Session has approved moving forward into the construction of the project and has contracted the cost of the project at \$5,505,000. The first phase will be for Leo A Daly to draw the construction drawings and then, for MCL to finalize subcontractors who will become part of the project.

From time to time I find a scripture passage that takes ahold of me and causes me to pause and think. Lately, it is a portion of scripture where the apostle Paul lifts up Christians in the area of Macedonia.

He explains sacrificial giving. If you have a chance, open your Bible to 2 Corinthians 8:1-5. The portion that caught my attention was – "their abundance of joy and their extreme poverty have overflowed in a wealth of generosity."

Their giving was a source of abundant joy! And they continued to give generously, even if their fortunes or net worth indicated they were crazy. Even in poverty they overflowed in a wealth of generosity.

Sacrificial giving is going beyond our means. Many people today are living beyond their means. What if we changed just one letter in that thought, from living beyond our means to giving beyond our means. Remember that faith is a muscle. If you never go to the gym, then don't expect to be able to bench press more than 100 pounds. With that in mind, if you're unwilling to take the risk of stretching your faith then your spiritual growth will be stunted, and eventually your faith muscle will be atrophy.

This week, take some time to meditate on 2 Corinthians chapters 8 and 9. Then ask the Lord to work in your heart. Ask him what changes you need to make to your lifestyle and financial stewardship.

There are three levels of giving – less than our ability, according to our ability, and beyond our ability. I believe it is fair to say that 96 percent of Christians in the Western world give less than their ability, perhaps 3 percent give according to their ability, and maybe 1 percent give beyond their ability.

A true disciple does not ask, "How much can I keep?" but, "How much can I give?" I figure that whenever I'm comfortable with my level of giving, it's time to raise it again.

Agape Book Reviews

As many of you know, we have an exciting new resource in our church library. It is known as the Social Justice section. We are hoping our congregation will utilize it as a way of learning about people of color (POC) especially what it's like to live in a predominantly white culture. There is so much to learn. And, as it turns out, much of the learning involves exploring what it means to be a white person. Yes, we white folks, in spite of our best intentions, have a lot to learn about what our whiteness means for ourselves AND for our brothers, sisters, and church family who are POC.

A great way to start learning is to explore the books in the Social Justice section of the library. There are books for all ages and all interests, whether it be history, biography, sociology or psychology. And though a majority of books focus on the lives of black people, there are a number of books about Hispanics and Native Americans.

Two of the children's books that caught my eye were Something Happened in our Town: A Child's

Story About Racial Injustice by Marianne Celano, Marietta Collins, and Ann Hazzard; and Not My Idea: A Book about Whiteness written and illustrated by Anastasia Higginbotham. I expected a quick read-through about how good parents are teaching their children that people of all colors are "good" people and deserve the respect and kindness that we give all our white friends. Well, that's not exactly how it went. I ended up re-reading these two books over repeatedly to fully comprehend their messages.

It's far more complex than "just being nice." In *Not My Idea* a young white child asks her mother about a variety of very confusing messages that adults tend to give about racism and how it should be handled. The child continues to question the fact that what her mother tells her and comforts her with, is not what she (the child) is feeling and experiencing, especially what she sees on the news and hears at school. It is very insightful and complex, but very current in its answers. And it is as important for the adult reader as it is for the child who reads it.

In Something Happened in Our Town a black family and a white family have separate discussions about what it's like to be a black person encountering the police. There is no judgement made about police officers in general. It is just an insightful view of the daily reality for black people



who must worry about every police officer they encounter, even when they are involved in perfectly legal, harmless activities, like walking down the street, or driving, or shopping. Again, these are painful and fatiguing realities that white people rarely have to think about.

I encourage you to check out these books whether you have children or not. They present the complexities and realities for all of us. young and old, no matter what the color of our skin. And they remind us that white people carry a special obligation to learn and care.

As you get acquainted with this new section of the library, I am very interested in hearing from you. If you have feedback (positive or negative), or books you would like to see in the library, please feel free to contact me about it. The library is limited in space, but we would be glad to give consideration to your request.


