Dear friends,

Happy Fall! It is that time of year when we adopt our routines for the year. This year, I am thinking about how many times I will travel the DLD highway (Detroit, Lincoln, Denver) to see both of my children. (Yes, this is really the name of the old highway connecting these cities.) I am wondering how we became a two-dog family. And, I look forward to new opportunities to serve the church. As I dive into this new year, I have decided to adopt some new spiritual disciplines. This year, I am centering my spiritual discipline on gratitude.

My interest in gratitude has stemmed from looking outside myself at a world where I see accusation and insult before I read thanks. The isolation of the last two years has led us collectively to attitudes of indifference and skepticism towards one another. I find that we are willing to buy into rhetoric or conspiracy theories that cut out our humanness, and instead we believe information from unknown sources. This process takes away our humanity and turns us into automatons.

While I am aware of the impact of the impersonal and angry rhetoric on me, I have not really claimed the impact of the negativity on my life. Perhaps, I had assumed that my occupation would somehow protect me from the noise, or that friendly voices would outstrip the negative ones. Well, those things help, but I wanted to shift the narrative of the voices coming to reframe the doubt into hope and the anger into forgiveness. These are exactly the ways that God works in us, and yet, I wanted to take an even more proactive role in living into God's blessings.

So, this year I am rededicating myself to several spiritual disciplines to renew a spirit of gratitude, practice appreciation of others, and embody a spirit of thanksgiving. In writing this, I am encouraging you all to do the same. Just like learning an instrument or playing a sport, our spiritual life takes intentionality, recommitment, and practice. So, here is what I have outlined for myself. For the first goal renewing a spirit of gratitude, I am changing my daily routine. I am a news junkie, and I have found that I was beginning each day turning on a radio news channel rather than beginning my day in thanksgiving to God. I am now beginning each day with scripture reminding myself that "this is the day the Lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad in it." (Psalm 118:24). In practicing my appreciation for others, I plan to begin my days at work with the

question, "How will God work through God's disciples today?" As Mr. Rogers noted, there are always helpers. I plan to ask with intentionality, "God, will you help me look for the helpers?" Finally, when the day is done, I plan to be more deliberate with my evening prayers. I have always had trouble admitting that the day has come to an end and usually find myself asleep on the couch watching Formula 1 racing. While I still might do that, I plan to move my prayer time up to 8:00 when we eat dessert, making sure that I don't miss that opportunity to give thanks.

I am inviting you all to join me this fall in renewing your spiritual practices. Feel free to borrow my plan or adopt your own. In any case, you are giving glory to God and showing gratitude for your life.

Our speaker for Tuesday, 4, 2022, will be Jessica Wade. Jessica is a reporter with the Omaha World-Herald covering Omaha's City Hall, transportation, and city development projects. She reached outside her city beat in 2021 to begin a series on the Genoa US Indian Industrial Boarding School. Though the school operated for 50 years as one of the largest federally-funded Indian Boarding Schools in the

US, little reporting exists on its operations and lasting impact. Through her reporting, Jessica's goal has been to gather an accurate history of what occurred at the school and to explore the legacy it left on descendants. She has also reported on local efforts to locate the school's cemetery, which has been lost for decades. Piecemakers Celebrate 21 Years - With a Sabbatical!

The Piecemakers fellowship group at Church of the Cross was formed in January 2001, and they have enjoyed prolific quilt making since the beginning. The mission of the group is to make unique baby quilts to welcome newborns into our church family. In the years since they began, they have delivered 216 baby quilts to families in the church. Meeting weekly from September to May each year, they have gathered in Room 11 of the church to enjoy each other's company while working together on 5-10 quilts in progress.

Their additional quilting projects have included donating quilts to Camp Calvin Crest for their fundraising auctions, making appreciation quilts for retiring staff, making seasonal banners for the Sanctuary, donating 40 full-size quilts to the church camp of our partner church in Gnozdovo, Russia, and making 100 tote bags for Bible School students in Gnozdovo.

The group has always welcomed novices as well as advanced quilters. They provide tasks in the quilting process to match each person's ability level and teach the quilting process at the same time.

In Fall 2022, with an inventory of 10+ completed quilts on hand, Piecemakers have decided to take a well-deserved break from meeting every week. The quilting will continue with a new format. ALL quilters in the PCOC congregation are invited to participate in a new process to ensure we continue to welcome newborns to our church family with handmade quilts. You will be invited to use the patterns, fabric, and even equipment available in Room 11.

Book Review for Agape for All

The Personal Librarian by Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray Submitted by Patty Ritchie

Recently I had the great good fortune to read this historical fiction. It is timeless in it insights into the human heart.

We travel through the early decades of 1900, with a young African American woman named Belle, who denies her true identity in order to protect herself and her family from racial persecution. It is a compelling, important story which sheds light on many aspects of how we navigate both societal norms and our own hopes and dreams.

Belle's life experiences are unique. Her skin tone and that of her family is very light, enabling her to "pass" as white. Her well-educated, loving parents are in disagreement about the best path forward for their family, after the important Civil Rights Act of 1875 is struck down in our country. Her opportunity to work for J.P Morgan and his burgeoning art and manuscript library as head librarian is a monumental social climb.

At what cost? As readers we are asked to consider our own lives, as we ponder the often dangerous balancing act she must achieve. While I applauded her courage, her dedication to excellence and her work ethic, I also cringed at her desperation, loneliness, and fear. I wonder who hides their true identities today and why?

This book is an excellent choice for book clubs, and includes thoughtful questions for discussions. Our PCOC library is waiting for you!
