Remembrance, Thanksgiving, & Anticipation

Blowing leaves, chilly temperatures, and a bountiful feast at Thanksgiving are all hallmarks of November in Nebraska. For Christians, November is even more. In addition to giving thanks, it is a time of remembrance for those we have lost, and it is a time of anticipation as Advent begins. Please join in our November events, and find comfort and cheer in our church community.

All Saints Day on Sunday, November 6. At both worship services, we will remember those in the congregation who have passed away in the last year.

Remembrance Service on Sunday, November 13 at 4:00 p.m. This special service is for anyone who has endured a loss. You are invited to light a candle for someone you are missing, find comfort in prayer and music, and be surrounded by the love of your church family. A cookie, punch, and coffee reception will follow in Fellowship Hall, hosted by Cross Care Connections.

Advent Workshop & Lunch on Sunday, November 20. Our Senior High Youth Group will prepare and serve lunch after late worship. After lunch, attendees are invited to make a variety of Christmas crafts. Please sign up by November 6, so we can order adequate craft supplies.

Hanging of the Greens on Saturday, November 26 & First Sunday of Advent on November 27. We might still be stuffed from Thanksgiving dinner, but the new Christian year is beginning with Advent, a time of anticipation and preparation for the coming Christ child. Join us at 10 a.m. on Saturday to decorate the church (see details on page 6) and for worship on Sunday at 9:00 and 11:10 a.m.

A Moment for Stewardship

During October at worship, I am hopeful that everyone understands that Stewardship, at least in part, is that each of us have received gifts from God, and it is our choice as to how we share these gifts with the world. To truly understand Jeremiah 29:11 from previous lessons is that God also bestowed on each of us the gift of choice or reason or preference or selection or understanding. That is a unique gift. As humans, we are involved in the decision-making process each day.



As Christians, we have heard that we are to share our time, talents, and treasures. The question becomes, just how is that done? It is a decision that each of us make.

Lately, I am intrigued with the mission work a group of our members have begun with Agape for All. It is understanding that we are all simply human. As humans, we are meant to be together. Together in a family. Together in a church. Together in a community. Together in a world.

There is a reason we do not take the time to listen to those who are suffering. To listen to the stories of the vulnerable is to become vulnerable. To hear stories of the helpless is to be reminded of our own human frailty. To listen openly to those in need is to feel responsible for their well-being.

The only way to keep ourselves protected, safe from empathizing with another person, is by refusing to hear their story. Otherwise, we may be tempted to care, tempted to respond, tempted to change, tempted to remember: They are just like me.

As a parent there are times when my children have asked me to share a story from my childhood. I generally react with a joke of my adolescent perfection or that I was simply a boring kid. To share some childhood episode from my life is more than a transfer of information and ideas. To tell stories from my childhood is to relive those moments. To share a story from my childhood is to ask my children to relive it with me, and there are many moments from my childhood I may not want to relive.

Storytelling is the most intimate form of communication. It is a way of inviting the listener to enter into what we have known, what we have suffered, what we have overcome, what brings us joy.

That is this mission's focus. To listen, to learn, to experience another's story. It is vastly important that the conversation begin. It is my prayer that each of us are searching for new ways to serve God. That each of us are considering how we share our treasures and understand how very fortunate we are. Belarus, Ukraine, Russia Mission (BURM) Network Conference Report

Presbyterian Church of the Cross has a close relationship with a partner church in Russia. Over the past 15 years, members of PCOC have travelled to Russia 12 times and,



a few times, their members have travelled to Omaha. These connections have been educational, inspiring, and rewarding for all, and they have resulted in many friendships and a commitment to maintain our partnership.

Since 2020, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, and now, due to the war in Ukraine, travel has not been possible, and communication is difficult. Our friends are fearful of outside communication with us, and we must be cautious about contacting them. Sometimes all we can do is be persistent in praying for them and their situation.

In October, a delegation of PCOC members attended the PC(USA) BURM Network Annual Conference, some in person and others via live streaming and Zoom. Here is a report of some of the things they learned:

What can be said about connecting with our partners in Russia, the Christians in Ukraine who are suffering from the war, the refugees in Belarus who are being used as pawns in a political game, the authoritarian regimes that are rising to political power in Europe and elsewhere, and the fact that we're fighting wars over access to fossil fuels that are also degrading our planet?

Lots can be said, and lots was said – we learned so much at the Belarus, Ukraine, Russia Mission (BURM) Network conference October 6-8. The conference was held in person in Green Bay, WI and virtually via livestream from the First Presbyterian Church in Green Bay. There was a LOT of great information. Here are some highlights.

The Presbyterian model for engagement has been "pairing" Russian and U.S. congregations. Since we cannot visit Russia now or in the near future, we will



want to find other ways to engage. It is important to stay in contact with our Russian friends, but we have to be very generic in our communications – messages that we're thinking about them are wonderful but we can't ask questions that could raise their visibility. So, we need to hold them in prayer and make small talk when we communicate with them.



There are programs we can connect with in the region that are making a difference, though, and we can learn more about them and visit them! Ellen Smith, our mission co-worker, invited Marlene Wall, president of

LCC International University in Lithuania to tell us about their very diverse student body (800+ students from 56 countries!) and the ways they're teaching peace-making. All students at this liberal arts college have four semesters of theology. The students aren't all Christians, but they all learn about Christianity. LCC is an inclusive and diverse place. Their Study Abroad is a 6-week program open to students from anywhere.

The Rev. Marek Kucharski, Chancellor of the Evangelical School of Theology in Wroclaw, Poland, told us of some of the ways they are helping refugees and seminary students from Ukraine. They are very thoughtful, they



listen, and they are working together with all other organizations, regardless of church affiliation, to help the refugees with food, clothing, language classes, jobs, counseling, and more. They have a long view and are building reserves for new needs as they develop.

Thinking about the reasons this war began and why it continues was a significant topic at the conference. We learned about the history of the region and how the borders have changed through the years.



We learned about the political climate and how a poor economy can lead to the election of Fascists. See the article from Luciano Kovacs, Presbyterian World Mission area coordinator and speaker at our con-



ference. We learned about how destructive our dependence on fossil fuels is. We fight wars over oil and as we burn it, we contribute to climate change, which is affecting agriculture in Ukraine. And the oil purchased from Russia provides them with funds to fuel the war. All these problems seem insurmountable but discussing them and understanding them helps us move toward change.

We hope you will be able to engage in this part of the world, learn and grow with us, and be inspired by the Christian actions taking place there. Join the BURM Facebook page. It's a private group so you must ask to join, but Ellen Smith, our mission coworker posts stories, articles, and information there continually. For example, she just posted an article on Energy Transformations for Ukraine to Become a New Green Power-house of Europe.

And for face-to-face conversations, please talk to Karen Morey, Marshall Zieman, Jean Waters, Rock Sumner, Sue Thomas, Mary Ann Pederson, Sandi Stuckey, or Clarence Waters – all of whom attended the conference in-person or virtually. Church of the Cross had the most attendees!

A group of 10 from PCOC enjoyed conversation, food, and the sleek new surroundings at Big Mama's Chicken and Best Burger, in North Omaha. The chicken and catfish were delicious! On October 7, nearly 100 community members and state and local officials attended an emotional unveiling ceremony outside the Douglas County Courthouse in Omaha to dedicate a historical marker memorializing George Smith, who was lynched by a white mob outside the courthouse in 1891. The new marker stands across from a second marker that acknowledges the lynching of Will Brown on the courthouse lawn in 1919. To confront our history of racial terror and its legacy is an essential step in the reconciliation process. Through song, poetry, and

prayer, speakers emphasized the healing and hope that comes from sharing the truth about our history. Charlene Weyand, Kathy Moore, and Patty Ritchie attended.





The Women's Conference in North Omaha, held at Trinity Lutheran Church was a very enriching day. Women joined together for fellowship, food, and workshops centering on the Holy Spirit in our Lives. Breakout sessions offered a variety of spiritual paths, including a look at racism. The keynote speaker, Viv Ewing, related stories from her professional and personal faith journeys, and encouraged us to invite the Holy Spirit to "Give us the words to say", when faced with difficult people in difficult situations. The combined membership choir led us in beautiful praise music. Ann Pearson was our representative! What a beautiful blending of women from all ages, a variety of ethnic and racial backgrounds, denominations, and life experiences. Kindness and conviction defined the day! The Holy Spirit is love.

And finally, Kathy Moore and Patty Ritchie continue to be involved in a planning committee for Community Conversations on difficult topics. The most recent event, "Your Vote, Your Power," was held at UNO on Thursday, October 13 where about 20 people gathered to hear a panel presentation on ballot initiatives that 1) could potentially require photo ID each time a person votes and 2) that gradually increases the minimum wage over a 4-year period to \$15/hour.

Panel members included the League of Women Voters and the Douglas County Election Commissioner who provided valuable information on the efficacy of the election process and the tools available to become an informed voter. Additional speakers described the potential effects of these two proposals. We had a half dozen church members attend. Book Review

"I was in prison and you visited me...." Matthew 25:36

On September 29 several of us from Agape for All had the distinct privilege of hearing an outstanding presentation by attorney and advocate for death row prisoners, Bryan Stevenson. Since the early days of his practice, Mr. Stevenson has operated the Equal Justice Initiative in Montgomery, Alabama. As it happens, we have two books in our Social Justice library related to Mr. Stevenson and his work. So this is a "two-fer" book report.

The first one is Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption. This book is the story of Walter McMillian, a young black man who is sentenced to death for a murder he did not commit. It describes how, against all odds, Bryan Stevenson ultimately brings justice to this inmate. There are heartwrenching stories of the total disregard for Mr. McMillian as a human being and a prisoner. Mr. Stevenson himself endures humiliating and infuriating episodes with prison personnel and fellow attorneys in order to bring out the real story of McMillian's innocence. Nikola Kristof, of the New York Times says of Bryan Stevenson, "He may, indeed, be America's Mandela."

Closely related in subject is a book about Ian Manuel: My Time Will Come; A Memoir of Crime, Punishment, Hope, and Redemption. Unlike Walter McMillian, Ian Manuel is guilty of a crime he committed as a thirteen-year-old, yes, thirteen-year-old. He shoots a woman in the face and the woman survives, but he is sentenced to death for the crime. No consideration is given for his age or his mental health at the time. Somehow, he manages to survive horrendous and tumultuous experiences in prison with adults. Additionally powerful is the struggle between Ian and his victim to develop a meaningful relationship of some kind. Ian feels a painful sense of remorse, but the victim, for a number of reasons, wants to, but can't, forgive him. As author Bryan Stevenson describes him, "Ian has held on to his magic" - breathtakingly beautiful poetry. Mr. Stevenson discovers Ian Manuel's situation and begins to advocate for him. The rest is an achingly beautiful story of true redemption. The story is inspiring, and Mr. Manuel's poetry is exquisite. A story of God in action.
