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As We Enter a New Season

The goal is that by the time Christmas finally rolls around we are fully ready to fully celebrate, because we've had enough time to get our houses, gifts, and hearts in order.

Although we know that December 25 will eventually roll around, Advent is meant to ensure that it actually means something when it does. That's why all our "Advent traditions" are so important – our Advent Workshop, our church-wide Advent Dinner, the music, the parties, the tree with presents, the Advent calendar, making crafts, the stories of angels, Mary, Joseph, Bethlehem, shepherds, and Magi...

Just as some folks like to "give up" something for Lent, others like to "add something" for Advent. You might add some time to give to a charitable cause, such as serving dinner at the Siena Francis House, or take part in some of the holiday projects with the Heartland Hope Mission, Completely Kids, Omaha Street School, or by ringing bells with the Presbyterian Men at a local Hy-Vee. "Adding something" to your normal gifting routine is a small, but significant way to add a blessing to your life and to someone else's, too.

we wait. So, we light another candle every Sunday. We think about Israel, waiting for a Messiah. We consider Mary and Joseph, heading to Bethlehem, waiting for the Christ-child to be born. We count down our own days to Christmas, maybe using an Advent paper chain to mark each passing day. We also remember that Christ promised to return to earth one day, even though he has tarried some 2,000 years. As we wait, we hope.

Celebrating Christmas as the Body of Christ

It's time to get out your favorite Christmas decorations and plan your favorite holiday traditions. Of course, in my family, there is an annual viewing of "How the Grinch Stole Christmas." We watch the original cartoon version with the drawings by Dr. Seuss and the music of Theodor Geisel. As I was making the calendar to plan this exciting event, I stopped to think about that story of cold-hearted Mr. Grinch and the busy Whos from Whoville preparing for Christmas much as we do. Despite the villainy of Mr. Grinch, the Whos from Whoville came together and celebrated Christmas.. Their joy melted Mr. Grinch's heart and he learned that Christmas was not about presents and decorations but about joy in the birth of Christ. As I think about the movie, I can't help but celebrate the Whos all coming together in community, holding hands, and singing about Christmas.

We eat the bread all together. We drink the juice all together. In doing this, we nourish not only our individual souls but the Body of Christ. Our church government, likewise, originates out of the Body. Our session are members of our congregation and decisions are made by the Body for the congregation. Our Presbyterian churches all belong to the Presbytery, and they are part of an extended family.

My question is do you come to the celebration of Christ's birth as part of the Body of Christ? Do you, like the Whos, join with your family to celebrate Christmas? In our modern world, more and more people are opting to stay home, watch Christmas Eve service from afar, and isolate themselves from the body of Christ. They use the holiday to relax instead of to renew, and the result is a Christmas that feels unfulfilled and incomplete. To cele-

brate Christmas, one that is meaningful, is to celebrate it with your family and your church family. To celebrate Christmas, is to come together," holding hands" and singing about the arrival of our Savior. This is what will heal your souls and renew your spirit! And of course, we have many opportunities to join this Christmas season. I want to invite especially to the Advent Dinner put on by our Deacon on December 4. It is a family feast for Church of the Cross. We have a Quiet Christmas on December 11 at 4:00 with a chance to be introspective and enjoy what is best of Advent. 

Book Review

After One Hundred Winters: In Search of Reconciliation on America's Stolen Lands

by Margaret D. Jacobs, Professor of History and Director of the Center for Great Plains Studies at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Here we go again! Whenever I pick up a new book in our Agape for AlI section of the library, I find Nebraskans at the heart of Social Justice issues. And given the two recent holidays of Indigenous People's Day (or Columbus Day) and Thanksgiving Day, it seemed appropriate to focus a while on Native American issues. The issues have been traumatic for Native Americans and they are deeply uncomfortable for us "settlers" to face and acknowledge. Yet as the reader finds out, there is great hope in the recent efforts of "settlers" to join the new movements of "Truth and Reconciliation" which have become so essential as we look back on the history of settlers and Native Americans.

Margaret Jacobs introduces her book with the touching story of the Tanderup family in Neligh, Nebraska. This couple, a decent and kind family, had farmed their acreage for several generations until faced with the prospect of the Keystone Pipeline ruining their land and way of life. Interestingly enough, they became acquainted with and joined forces with a number of Native American tribes who, for the SECOND time were facing desecration of their lives by invasive forces. The tribes included the Ponca, Omaha, Winnebago and Santee Sioux. (Does Neligh, Nebraska sound familiar? Do these tribes sound familiar?) As these folks joined forces, they became friends. And as the Tanderups heard the tragic stories of the tribes on whose land they were living, they joined an effort called the "Truth and Reconciliation Movement." First they listened to and faced the truth that, as a result of treaty violation and thefts of land by the American government (starting in 1858), the Poncas had been robbed of food sources, housing, and contracted malaria which resulted in loss of 25% of their population. They realized that this is the "Westward Expansion" and "Opening of the West" we have all read about in American History books.

As an act of reconciliation, the Tanderups invited the Poncas and Pawnee to plant a medicine bag of corn seeds they had held onto since 1887. The big question was whether the seeds would grow! To the

delight of everyone, they grew and thrived! Subsequently the Tanderups returned several acres of their land to the tribes.

Ms. Jacobs continues to describe the tragic, destructive forces that all Native Americans in this country have endured over the last three hundred years. It becomes very clear that the intention of the American Government was to annihilate the people and culture of Native Americans on this land. It is also clear that not all settlers wanted this to happen. In one interesting chapter, she describes the intentions of good settlers gone wrong, much of which happened in the Indian Boarding Schools we are hearing about so much lately. Two of the primary schools mentioned were the well-known government-run school in Genoa Nebraska, and a Presbyterian-run missionary school for the Omaha tribe in Burt and Thurston counties around 1946. (Read The Middle Five: Indian Schoolboys of the Omaha Tribe by Francis La Flesche).

I join Ms. Jacobs in emphasizing that these stories and this history is not told with the goal of producing shock or pain or guilt, but to provide knowledge, insight, enlightenment, and motivation to seek ways of reconciliation. As you will learn reading this book, the Native Americans of our great nation are far more interested in peaceful resolution and forgiveness that they ever were in warfare with settlers and cowboys.
