2023 Lenten Study


One of our most beloved churchwide activities is starting soon – The Lenten Study! Small groups will begin a 6-week study on February 26 and end on Palm Sunday, April 2. We'll be studying Susan Robb's book, Seven Words - Listening to Christ from the Cross.

In this book, Robb looks at Christ's final words on the cross through a lens that finds life and hope in his final sayings, while exploring each from a biblical and historical perspective. This book brings a hopeful and contemplative take on the cross during the weeks of Lent. Register online or at the Information Desk before February 12.

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Matthew's Lens

If you are watching the liturgical calendar, you will notice that we have settled into our ordinary time green between Advent and Lent. In ordinary time, we focus on the teachings of Jesus as recorded by our Gospel writers, and this year, our focus is the book of Matthew. While all the Gospel writers tell us about the Good News of Jesus Christ and provide an outline of his life, they all have a unique perspective and specific emphasis.

Matthew, in many ways, is the Gospel that we know best. While he includes the expected Jesus' benchmarks in life, birth, baptism, transfiguration, death, and resurrection, it is in Matthew that we find some of the other central themes of our faith. It is only in Matthew that we find the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7), the bulk of the Parables of the Kingdom (Matthew 13), identifying Peter as the Rock (Matthew 16:18), and the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19). Beyond these (and other) unique examples, Matthew also has an overall emphasis in his narrative that is different from Mark and Luke. As you listen to the Gospel reading each week, I think you will begin to hear these themes come out, and I think they will shape your discipleship this year.

One of the these that we pick up in whole of Matthew is an emphasis on The Kingdom of Heaven. This is the theological premise on how the human reality of social, political, religious reality will look like when God is sovereign. This is a world that lives in God's love, peace, joy, and hope and one where oppression, injustice, fear, and evil cease. Wow! Take a minute to truly imagine this world. And, in Matthew, we learn that the Kingdom of God is ushered in with Christ but will not be perfected until he comes again. In this way, we are inspired by the teachings and encouragement to live as Kingdom people. Our denomination has recently emphasized Matthew 25 where it is encouraging churches to adopt practices that reflect this kingdom. (Matthew 25: 34-36). In our tradition, we recognize that we are called to go out into the world, to be involved in it and with it to make the world a better place, to respond to our call as Jesus' disciples.

Another emphasis of Matthew that you might hear this year is that Jesus is the fulfillment of Jewish prophecy. We hear this in the scripture as we note how many times that Matthew quotes or alludes to Hebrew scripture. What is important for us is to

understand that Jesus comes to fulfill the law (Matthew 5:17). This is important as it emphasizes that the Old Testament and the New Testament are both written so that humans can live in harmony with God's intentions. Sometimes I hear that people think the Old Testament is irrelevant, but Matthew reminds us otherwise, that God's intention has always been and continues to be for us to live in harmony with God and with one another. As the prophet Micah writes, the Lord requires from us, "to do justice, to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God." (Micah 5:8). What is uniquely different is that in sending Jesus to us, God has taken on our sin so that we no longer have to live in fear of what lies next. Rather we can live in assurance of God's grace and, therefore, respond to the world, even in its brokenness, with joy and promise. Jesus is the promised one who will make all things new. (Isaiah 43:19, 2 Corinthians 5:17).

It is exciting to jump into this new year wondering how scripture will speak to us and how we will continue to grow as Christ's disciples. Matthew is comforting in its familiarity and challenging in its message. Let's see what God has in store for us.

Book Review *White Too Long* by Robert P. Jones

The author holds a PhD in religion from Emory University and a MDiv from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He is the CEO and founder of Public Religion Research Institute and a leading scholar and commentator on religion and politics.

This book is praised by reviewers as "compelling, powerful and much needed, a marvel, showing a clear moral vision, a moral indictment of the way white supremacy has infected the white church in the United States from its very beginning."

The Chapter Headings outline the examination.

- Seeing: Our Current Moment
- **Remembering:** Christianity as the Conductor of White Supremacy
- Believing: The Theology of White Supremacy
- Marking: Monuments of White Supremacy
- **Mapping:** The White Supremacy Gene in American Christianity
- Telling: Stories of Change
- **Reckoning:** Toward Responsibility and Repair
- Afterword: White Christians have only begun the work of reckoning with white supremacy and to bind the wounds we have inflicted on black and brown citizens and to recover our own ability to live more faithfully in the world. But there are signs of hope.

The author draws on history, public opinion surveys, personal experience, as well as copious data and research. It is provocative. We are asked to reckon, for our own sakes, our Christian faith, and for our nation, with the legacy which includes oppression. Do I as a reader, want to claim this legacy? In all honesty, I do not. It is uncomfortable and bruises my ego, yet I must consider the legacy, and try to understand the fuller, more accurate history as it now unfolds. In the Presbyterian denomination which includes the description "reformed faith", this is my path. I found the author's voice both humble and fervent. His personal reflections include both life affirming experiences which are full of love and support for his own community, but also simultaneous paradox - the cruelty and bigotry of extreme racial bigotry. - Submitted by Patty Ritchie
