Mission Exploration in Moldova and Romania, Part 1: Moldova

There is so much to share; it is hard to know where to begin! In September, Anne Wattles and I traveled to Moldova and Romania with Ellen Smith and a small group of other Presbyterians to explore mission partnership opportunities in these two countries bordering Ukraine. It was a whirlwind itinerary, spending time with seven different organizations who are doing impressive work with Ukrainian refugees, elderly citizens, and young people. In every city, we were hosted by people in these organizations with generous hospitality, open hearts, and passionate commitment for their causes.

Moldova is about the size of Maryland and is the poorest country in Europe. Yet, in proportion to their population, they have taken in more Ukrainian refugees then any other European nation. Agencies originally focused on other critical social services have stepped up to organize programs to serve the refugees flowing into the country.

In Chisinau (the capital city), the young leadership team of YMCA Moldova (director pictured to right) obtained a grant from HP for 500 laptops, which they distributed to village schools, creating an inventory and control system which HP asked them to share with other grant recipients.



They then provided instruction to teachers on how to teach the use of the laptops. The schools are extremely grateful, as the village schools do not have the same resources as the schools in the cities. The YMCA now also operates a shelter for up to 30 Ukrainian refugees, helping them locate more permanent residences, schools for children, and jobs.

Homecare, also in Chisinau, provides nursing and home care for the elderly in villages all over Moldova and also finds housing for Ukrainian refugee families.

In Balti, Moldova, we toured the Healthy City Refugee Center, a project supported by Church World Services and others. The Center was organized very quickly to respond to the refugee crisis and the local leadership team built a distribution system for food supplies, hygiene, clothing, blankets, and other items, serving 300 Ukrainian families per week. Now, with a staff of

36, and a working system in place, they describe themselves as being in transition from the "emergency phase" to an "integration phase," working to help refugees to meet Moldovans and become integrated into the society. They are now providing language classes, vocational and technical

training, job placement services, and a hotline.

In Edinet, Moldova, we spent two days with the director of Moldova Christian Aid (MCA), an agency which



partners with churches to provide services to the most needy elderly in villages. MCA also manages a project in concert with PDA (Presbyterian Disaster Assistance) to provide a flock of chickens for Ukrainian refugee families (one family pictured above), to help them be self-sustaining. We visited several of these families.

We have so many stories about the people we met as we traveled among the cities and villages of Moldova and about the remarkable leadership of these agencies. Please ask us!

BURM Conference Peacebuilding and Partnering in Eastern Europe

Church of the Cross is hosting the 2023 Annual BURM Conference on November 2-4, 2023, and YOU are invited to participate!

For 14 years, Church of the Cross has been a member of the Belarus, Ukraine, and Russia Mission (BURM) Network, a network of PC(USA) churches partnering with churches in Russia. In our partnership with a small church in Gnozdovo, a village near the city of Smolensk, many members of our church got to know the people, developed an understanding of our common bonds in Christianity, and worked together to serve their community. We learned to see each other as Christians – not as Russians or Americans – and all lives were enriched and our faith was strengthened.

With the current war in Ukraine, travel to Russia, Ukraine, or Belarus is nearly impossible and not safe. While we make efforts to maintain contact

with our friends in Gnozdovo, we have also been considering other ways to serve in the region. Our mission co-worker, Ellen Smith, has been reaching out to potential partners in Lithuania, Poland, Moldova, and Romania, seeking opportunities to continue to serve with Christians in Eastern Europe. At the BURM Conference, we will hear updates from Ellen and the stories from two specific partners – the Hope Center in Vilnius, Lithuania and LCC International University in Klaipeda, Lithuania. (Both of these organizations were visited by a team from PCOC earlier this year.)

Larisa, the Founder and Director of the Hope Center, has an amazing testimony of God providing resources at just the right time to build the center's work of helping the homeless in Vilnius and now the Ukrainian refugees.

Naomi Enns, the Director of the Peace Center for Dialogue and Conflict Transformation at LLC University, will discuss the Center's focus on peacebuilding – a long-term process of creating the necessary conditions for sustainable peace. Naomi will be with us in person, and will provide two sessions at the conference: the first to provide fundamental knowledge of peacebuilding methods, and the second, a workshop to help use these skills.

Our third guest speaker, Carl Horton, is Coordinator of the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program. More information can be found about this program at https://www.presbyterianmission.org/story/pcusa-celebrates-40-years-of-the-commitment-to-peacemaking-during-2023-season-of-peace.

This conference is a unique opportunity to learn about and from partners in Eastern Europe and to gain skills that we can use at home and abroad. The BURM network is at a pivotal point – how should we and how can we change to meet the situation in Eastern Europe? What is God calling us to do next? We sincerely hope you will make plans to attend this conference and help us take the next steps – whatever those may be.

The conference will be held in-person at Presbyterian Church of the Cross on November 2 (evening), November 3 (all day), and November 4 (morning). There is also a virtual option. Please invite your friends (especially students) to attend the conference as well; this is a rare opportunity to hear these voices right here in Omaha!




Agape for All -Where All Are Welcome to Learn and Listen

By the time you are reading this article, summer will be winding down, and we will be well into the fall season. Agape for All provided several spring and summer experiences including gospel brunches, museum tours, a Unity Walk, attendance at a Pow wow, and the addition of many new library books. A new class offering kicked off the end of September, and we will be brainstorming new ideas for experiences after the first of the year.

One upcoming event you might be interested in is an Annual Fundraising Walk-a-Thon, hosted by First Presbyterian Church on Sunday, October 8. It is an event that will support housing assistance through Youth Emergency Services (YES) and InCOMMON Community Development. Due to other obligations, we are not hosting an official Agape for All Team for this event, but we would encourage any of you interested in a "walk with a purpose" on a beautiful fall day to register at http://www.fpcomaha.org/ Matthew25. Details and times are provided in the image below. Afterwards there will be agency and sponsor booths, the Table Grace food truck, a bounce house, and a raffle.



Agape for All has organized some group activities but equally meaningful are those occasions that an individual finds and experiences on their own. We'd love for you to share any of those with us, as Ann Pearson has done later on this page.

Our trip to UNO's "Undesign the Red Line" Exhibit on August 23 was powerful. Several PCOC members joined congregants from St. Luke's Methodist in Elkhorn for a challenging exploration of not only the practice of red lining (real estate exclusion of

members of our society from certain neighborhoods) but a wide variety of shameful policies, practices, and laws.

We now have a better understanding of decades, even centuries of discrimination. While the evidence is overwhelming, we can intentionally forge a new future - together. For me, the essential "take away" from this densely illustrated and researched display is the final panel. We can REFRAME history. We can REIMAGINE what we need to do now. We can REINVEST. with time and resources.





The exhibit is free, located in Room 218 of the Community Engagement Center at UNO. It is easy to study and follow, and it is well worth the investment of an hour or two. We would encourage everyone to visit it at least once. It is open to the public for unguided tours Thursdays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Guided tours can be arranged for Mondays between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m., Tuesdays between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. or Wednesdays between 2 and 6 p.m.

Reflections from an Agape Event **Submitted by Ann Pearson, PCOC Member**

On Friday July 28, 2023 a remarkable moment took place on 24th and Patrick Street in North Omaha. A historical marker was placed in memory of Vivian Strong. In 1969 Vivian was a 14-year-old teenager enjoying music with her friends in a vacant apartment. When the police arrived, she and her friends ran, and the police officer shot Vivian in the back of her head, killing her instantly. The episode was followed by three nights of angry rioting. OPD Officer James Loder was later acquitted of her murder.

The monument has been a long time coming and the Strong family couldn't have expressed their appreciation and gratitude and forgiveness more sincerely. Among those present at this dedication of this beautiful marker were sponsors who included History Nebraska, Omaha Economic Development Corporation, and Dr. and Mrs. Franklin Thompson. The Planning Committee included the Strong family, the Great Plains Black History Museum, Preston Love with Black Lives Matter, and Dr. Cynthia Robinson, Chair of the UNO Black Studies Department.

There were prayers, singing, speeches of gratitude and forgiveness, and very meaningful acknowledgement from Deputy Chief Anna Colon of the OPD that "accountability was not served.(and alhough).we cannot undo the actions of the past, we can make a solemn vow prevent such tragedies from happening again." The prevailing tone of the event was acknowledging the tragedies of the past, forgiving but not forgetting them, and looking forward to the future with new resolve and unity. The Strong family spoke eloquently and firmly about the road to forgiveness and Deputy Chief Anna Colon (a person of color) spoke of the need for unity. After the dedication of the marker, the family walked up to 24th and Grant Streets where a religious marker was also dedicated. It should be noted that a segment of 21st Street has been designated as Vivian Strong Street.

It was a phenomenal moment of remembrance, forgiveness, and promise for the future. If the Strong family can be hopeful and forgiving, so can all of us. I felt so honored and privileged to be part of it.

Killers of the Flower Moon: The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI written by David Grann is a tough one. And if at first it seems a bit more political than it should, I hope you will see the importance of the story as we go. As with all the Indian tribes in this country, the Osage were forced onto a reservation in Kansas in 1825. Then in 1870 they were forced to move again by "the Europeans" (as we were called by the Indians) to what became known as Osage County.

The Europeans thought the land was worthless prairie land. The Osage were smart enough to know that

if they paid for the land, they owned it and should be able to control it themselves. They believed in collective ownership so that every member of the tribe could benefit. There were 2,229 of them. And when oil was discovered, they literally became the richest people on earth. They started buying nice homes and cars and clothing. They started travelling. And suddenly, in the eyes of the Europeans, the Osage became "ignorant savages" who couldn't possibly understand how to manage money properly. They will waste it. They will squander it. They don't deserve it.

The federal and state government set up several systems of guardianships and headrights (a form of land rights) that were designed to "protect" the Osage from themselves. Instead, they became victims of what became an outrageous chapter of racism, greed, and murder known as The Reign of Terror. Of course, all along white men had been marrying Osage women to inherit the wealth that came with their headrights. But suddenly these women and their offspring began to die; poison was being slipped into their alcohol, doctors were prescribing insulin with poison in it, and they were being found dead in creeks. People who tried to talk about it or report possible leads on killers disappeared. White men were getting richer and Osage people, including their children, were dying. Finally, when a house and an entire family were blown up, the newly formed FBI under J. Edgar Hoover got involved. He sent an agent, Tom Hall, to investigate, and partial justice was eventually served. Unfortunately, the worst offender was never punished adequately, and the Osage suspected that dozens of these murders went unsolved. Eventually in 2011, a suit was settled for 380 million dollars.

Relatives of these families continue to comfort each other and seek information. A movie is coming out in October based on the book. There are PBS panels and interviews that can be found on You Tube. I encourage you to seek these out and get acquainted with the descendants of this amazing, loving group of people. You would expect to find a lot of anger and bitterness, but it is not there. There is patience and a certain persistence in looking for the truth. And finally, you will not hear any of them mourning the loss of the millions of dollars stolen from them. They just feel a hole in their collective hearts for the loss of so many of their family members. We can all learn from them and be impressed and grateful for their principled insistence that voice be given to the victims and lost descendants.
