Not Yet Ready for Christmas

I confess that as I sit down to write this December *Cross Currents* article, I haven't yet had a chance to think much about Christmas. And then it hits me – this is exactly why we have Advent. I'm not in the Christmas Spirit yet, but through celebrating Advent, I trust that I will be. I haven't thought much about shopping for presents, but through celebrating Advent, shopping will be on my mind in due course. And what about all those other things? Christmas music? Christmas parties? Christmas goodies? The tree, the lights, the decorations? Plenty of time for all of that in Advent.

Advent is the reason we don't have to worry about missing Christmas. In the four weeks of Advent, we will have all the time we need to get ready. We will have all the time we need to let what's really important sink in.

We need to hear the carols. We need to see Christmas lights going up, house by house. We need to see more Advent candles being lit, Sunday by Sunday. We need to look forward to special worship services – either Quiet Christmas or Big Music Sunday or Christmas Eve. We need to have them on our calendars and anticipate being there in our Sanctuary.

We also need to think about why this Advent could be different than others. Maybe our children or grandchildren will be old enough to enjoy it more. Maybe we have more to be thankful for, and we realize it. Maybe we'll have family in or travel to visit someone else. Or maybe someone won't be here this year, and their absence will cause an obvious void. Or perhaps our mobility (or lack thereof) will cause us to slow down our pace and limit our activities. No two Advents are exactly alike.

In the church calendar, Advent (not New Year's Day) begins a new year. That's right, we start the year with four weeks of anticipation, while hope, peace, joy, and love bring us again to the manger and the new-born king. Thus, we aren't ending the year on a high note, we're beginning a new year this way.

May Advent this year usher in a new season of contemplation, contentment, and anticipation into your life. Embrace Advent, embrace the waiting. Look for God to walk with you as we count down the days together. Ask God to open your mind this year to all that Christmas really means. This is why we have Advent.


Session Sets Course for Fellowship Hall Renovation




Lessons & Carols Organ Concert

This has been an amazing venture, and we are blessed to be able to use our facility as we plan for future generations.

Per Capita goes to offset the administrative costs for our Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly. Bach's St. Matthew Passion Led by Cindy Sloan Sundays, January 7 – February 11 at 10:00 a.m.

About this class from Cindy: Bach considered his St. Matthew Passion his "Great" Passion, his greatest work. To many musicians and music scholars, it is his greatest work. It contains music of unequalled beauty and skill, profound theological insights, and truths about God and humanity. Peter Kalkavage states that Bach "was reaching out to all his fellow human beings, believers and nonbelievers alike, and impressing upon them what was for him the potent truth of the Christian faith." To many, listening to it is not only a journey into the suffering, the passion, of Christ but also to understand the great love that God has for us and to contemplate individually and corporately what this love from the cross means.

We will listen to and study five sections of the Passion focusing on the compositional process, the theological issues presented through the music, and discuss what we all hear and feel in the music. Bach was trying to move and convince us of the importance of the crucifixion by journeying with him through the musical setting of the words of Matthew, arias that reflect on the action of the story, choruses that are part of the people witnessing the events, and chorales that we all sing together providing for us the truth of each section.

BURM — Energy, Enthusiasm, & Room for Expansion Submitted by Jean Waters

The annual conference of the Belarus, Ukraine, and Russia Mission (BURM) Network was held at Presbyterian Church of the Cross on November 2-4. We had many of our members in attendance plus many from other churches who have relationships with Russian churches through our mission co-worker, Ellen Smith.



Our conference included an informative presentation about Eastern Europe, the diversity of the people, their religion, their history, and the shifting borders of the countries there. Energy came especially from 16 students who attended all or part of the conference. We learned about peacebuilding in Europe through LCC International University and the peacemaking initiatives and resources of PCUSA. It is fair to say that people left with renewed energy and enthusiasm to travel in Eastern Europe, to visit and listen to our existing and new partners there, to hone our skills, and to help make connections.

Dr. Nicolae Roddy, Professor in the Theology Department at Creighton University and a native of Romania, provided background on the history and people in Eastern Europe. He reminded us that the span from east to west of the region shown is

about half the distance across the U.S. (1300 miles) The north to south distance is 1100 miles. The religious diversity includes countries that are primarily Orthodox, Roman Catholic, or mixed with Orthodox or Catholic, Protestants, and unaffiliated. He explained some major sociocultural considerations that exist on a continuum.

Westerners are more on the left side, Eastern Europeans are more on the right side but it's mixed.

Individual ----- Communal orientation Guilt (moral) ------ Shame (social) in selfperceived attitudes and expectations Personal responsibility ------ Sense of insignificance (especially post-communism)

We all have a lot to learn - we hope you'll join us on the journey!

The Rev. Carl Horton, coordinator of the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program came to this conference. The peacemaking program has many resources of interest to groups at PCOC. Also, his office is planning a travel study to Lithuania Oct 14-24 with Ellen Smith. Members of PCOC may be interested to join in this opportunity!

Ellen Smith, our mission co-worker, updated us on her travels and the people she met in Lithuania,



Moldova, and Romania. PCOC continues to be blessed with the relationship with Ellen. We can travel with her and benefit from the connection with Christians across the world. We can learn from them as well as give to them.

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Namoi Enns, the Director of the Peace Center for Dialogue and Conflict Transformation at LCC International University in Klaipeda, Lithuania, shared the difficulty that some of the LCC students have with each other because their countries are at war with each other. She taught



us how she helps the students come together and understand their emotions and find ways to move forward. We participated in an exercise to improve communications and help us see points that allow change towards reconciliation and resolution. LCC University offers innovative opportunities for American students to take a "gap" year and study at LCC. We think this is a unique and exciting opportunity for our youth at PCOC.



We closed out the conference with a world café workshop led by PCOC elder, Karen Morey. The idea mural (created by PCOC elder and artist, Patty Ritchie, pictured at top of next column) included ideas and themes generated from the workshop dis-



cussions: "we are called to love," "we are a connectional denomination," "we can learn from each other," "the need is greater than ever," "we have skills we can build upon and share," and many more.

There was a lot of energy, even at the end of the conference. People are renewed and ready to do more. We hope you will join us now and in the future!!! Save the date: next year's conference will be held October 24-26, 2024 in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Agape Book Report Submitted by Lucinda Sloan

In this era where competing ideologies and narratives spar over how our history should be taught, *The Rediscovery of America: Native Peoples and the Unmaking of U.S. History* by Ned Blackhawkdoes not rewrite our narrative, but enhances and completes it. He writes that if we have come to understand how slavery relates to "the making of America," why have America's "original caretakers" remained almost nonexistent in our narrative? Native American scholars maintain that American Indians were and are central to every century of U.S. historical development.

The book covers five centuries and includes all the European nations who attempted to colonize America. The word colonize is accurate because what Europe attempted was the harvesting of America's wealth: its land, minerals, gold, food, animal products, wood, and water. In doing so, everything the Native Americans considered sacred was taken, leaving nothing in its place but waste and destruction. Europeans resorted to violence in order to get this wealth. The Indians were eliminated through genocide, forced to leave their homes and land with deportation, and lied to regularly through broken treaties.

As the controlling government, the Europeans tried to assimilate the Native Americans by forcibly removing their children from their homes and families and placing them in boarding schools where they would be "educated." The children were forced to speak only English and wear only European clothing. They were denied any practice of their religion, culture, or arts. The goal was to "remove the Indian from them." Five centuries later this process of assimilation has remained a failure. They continue to insist on the right to earn a living as they see fit, to live on their sacred lands, to continue to practice their religion, keep their children, and have their own governmental agencies. They desire to be free from racial discrimination.

Native Americans fought for America as soldiers in both World Wars, without the benefits of citizenship. After the Civil War they were not included in the 13th, 14th, and 15th amendments. They argued that they should have dual citizenship. The words of Senator Orville Platte (Senator from Connecticut from 1879-1905) speak volumes: "The Redman has no right which the white man is bound to respect andno treaty or contract made with him is binding."

As a child I wondered why Ohio had so many Indian names. The name Ohio is from the Indian word "ohi-yo" which means "beautiful river." There are 14 counties, lakes, and cities that have Indian names. I never learned this. I also never learned where the Indians went after the English defeated the French and took control of the Great Lakes area. I did learn that the Indians fought with both the French and the English in their wars. "The enemy of my enemy is my friend."

Every page of the book contains facts about America that I never knew. There is never a tone of accusation or condemnation. It is a straight-forward retelling of American history taking into account the narrative of the Native Americans who were the original caretakers of this land. The author does get to tell the story of his people so that we realize how incomplete our American history is without them. I recommend every teacher read this book. It is beautifully written and includes the numerous, essential, and unknown contributions made to America by Native Americans. As a nation, we are incomplete if we do not know the history of the Original Americans.
