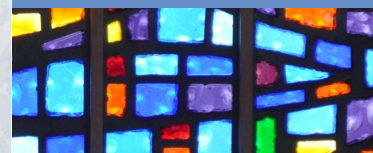

Observing a Holy Lent

Somehow, the season of Lent is upon us once again. We observed Ash Wednesday on Valentine's Day, marking our entrance into this season of penitence and introspection with the Imposition of Ashes. This season of preparation is meant to help us get ready for Easter. Now, our Lenten Study groups have started up, and together we will gather around God's Word to spur each other on, encouraging each other to observe a "Holy Lent."

Lent has both an inward and an outward side to it. On one hand, we're supposed to reflect more on Jesus, to consider him more, to think more about his call on our lives. We're supposed to draw nearer to him in prayer, to be in this conversation with him as we consider the kind of persons he wants us to become. So, we draw apart more, to spend time with him.

But, this drawing apart is not meant to turn us into monks. As proof of what we believe about him, we need to consider our actions. Better put, we need to make sure we're doing something to help others.

Sometimes we help others from a distance – we donate to One Great Hour of Sharing to help those in trouble around the world. We donate to Heartland Hope so those who come to them in need are helped. We might choose another local mission to write a check to. We love our local partners and are glad to support them.

Sometimes we feel the urge to give more directly – we head to Siena Francis House to serve our homeless population in person. We can go help by loading groceries at a Heartland Hope Food Drive. We can bring our child or grandchild to the Zoo to spend a morning assisting in needed crafts. We go out to Camp Calvin Crest for a work day.

What we're not supposed to do in Lent is stand idly by, merely "observing" it all happen. That's the only issue I have with the phrase "observe a Holy Lent" – we're not supposed to just observe others doing it all. Merely observing it all happen around us is to miss the point entirely. If I merely observed Valentine's Day by acknowledging its existence, my wife and family might feel a little left out. So, I invite you, in the ancient words,

"to observe a Holy Lent,
by self-examination and penitence,
by prayer and fasting, by works of love,
and by reading and meditating on the Word of
God."

Let's all try to draw even nearer to God and to others between now and Easter on March 31.

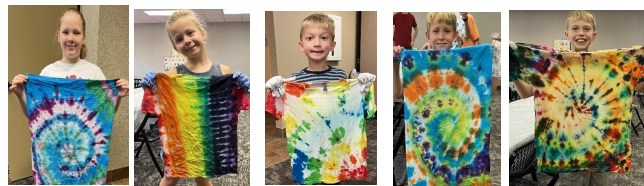

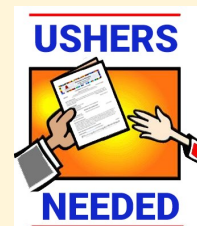

Agape for All Book Review Deacons March Update

Code Talker: The first and only memoir by one of the original Navajo code talkers of WWII

Written by Chester Nez with Judith Scheiss Avila

This is a touching memoir written by a fascinating man who was part of an extraordinary group of Marines in WWII who were a vital force in winning the war with Japan. As some of you know, they were known as Code Talkers and they developed the only code in WWII that the Japanese could not break.

Mr. Nez describes his life starting with his happy childhood on a shepherd's farm to his humiliating, and cruel treatment in boarding school. He makes a point of the fact that students were subjected to cruel and unnecessary discipline and were forbidden to speak even one word of their own Navaho language.

Regarding his much preferred life at home, he does tell of the horrific summer when government agents dug large trenches on his father's land and proceeded to herd the domesticated sheep into these trenches. Having gotten the animals into the trenches, the agents sprayed the creatures with a flammable chemical and started them on fire. His description of the screams of the sheep, the stench of burning wool and flesh, and the heart wrenching grief of his entire community brought tears to my eyes and disgust with a government that would do such a thing. Mr Nez's sin was that he had been such a successful shepherd - that he was using too much land (of his own) and the government needed it for development.

The next section of the book talks about his years in the Marine Corps during WWII. He describes the development of the Navajo language-based code that was the only code the Japanese could never break.

The Navajo's code talking skills were so vital to the success of the USA's war efforts that code talkers could not take leave with their fellow Marines. They were so important that they were assigned personal bodyguards 24 hours a day. While black Marines were separated from white soldiers, the code talkers were not segregated.

Their role was so secretive that they were not permitted to talk about it with anyone but each other. This was true even after the war ended. In fact, Mr. Nez and his team were not permitted to discuss their heroic role and contributions until 1968.

Mr. Nez talks about his postwar life including the joy of marriage and family, and his ability to enjoy life and options away from the reservation. He also speaks of the misery of post-war Post Traumatic Stress Disorder and of his diabetes. The complications of diabetes led to the amputation of parts of both his legs. He recounts a time when he and a friend were almost shot by two fellow Marines who assumed that they were Japanese. Imagine: two Japanese in Marine uniforms.

The one thing that gave him and his team great pleasure, however, was wondering what their cruel boarding house Matrons would think about the idea of the Navajo language being so highly valued in the winning of the war.

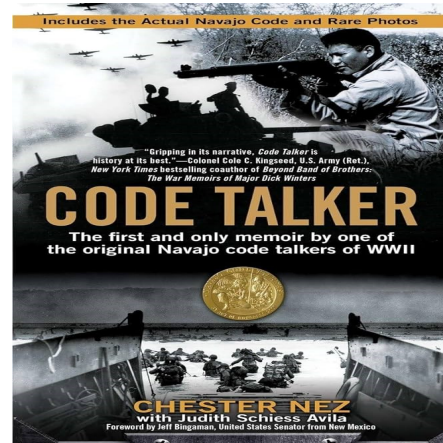
In spite of the tragedies and triumphs of his life,

Chester Nez is quoted as saying "It's been a good life so far!" (April 2010)

This is an individual and group who, in spite of cruel and unfair treatment by the United States and "Christian" efforts to save them from themselves, had the courage and integrity to fight faithfully for their homeland. Their Navajo religion, integrity, and values, (similar to though not the same as

Christian values) served us all in such a crucial time in history. We need to be grateful for their selfless service. Let us not overlook their courage, integrity and faithfulness.

This book is well worth our time to read. We have so much to learn.
