More than

mere concepts, learning how to implement these actions is truly important for recovering from past grievances and suffering on a societal level, and also on a personal level, such as working through conflict in a family. I am thankful to have been a part of this group on this trip.

And, of course, I'm thankful for all the saints at PCOC and our partnership in the gospel!

Three Months In

Well. Somehow it's November. And my family and I have already spent a quarter of this year living in Omaha. We are so happy to have become a part of Presbyterian Church of the Cross and remain very excited to share our new life here with visiting friends and family. We thank God, and all of you, for making this chapter in our life a gift that we continue to treasure.

As one might imagine, our new chapter here has been full of adjustments, observations, and relationship building. As Associate Pastor, getting to know our church has been a fascinating and joy-giving experience. Importantly, one of the things that has struck me time and again during my first few months here, is the genuine and deep sense of hospitality and social connectivity that exists at our church.

During what I am sure will be a tumultuous national -political reality for us all throughout this month (regardless of your preference for who wins the election), I would like for us all to take some time and think on our church's present sense of unity.

When I look out at our congregation during fellowship hour, cornerstone, or any other number of our wonderful programs we offer, I see bonds that go beyond the cordial pleasantries of familiarity and acquittance. In this time of national division and caustic rhetoric, I want us to consider how we can be intentional about maintaining our sense of unity and identity beyond the immediate future while continuing to grow spiritually.

For me, as I consider such, the imagery of Ephesians comes to mind: Christ is the cornerstone of the Church and each new believer is grafted into the body/building of the Church. In this way, the Church is always growing, and yet the identity and foundation of the Church does not waver. How do we maintain the better parts of our collective being while actively pursuing that kind of growth and continuity?

Another image that comes to mind for me may seem subversive: Robert Frost's poem The Mending Wall; for those of you who are unfamiliar with it, Mending Wall is the source of our great American axiom "good fences make good neighbors." Ironically, I think knowing and understanding an appropriate

amount of distance actually helps people to feel like they belong. Afterall, boundaries are what helps us define where "home" begins and ends. And yet, along with mending walls, I think longer tables also tend to make good neighbors. Can we draw closer to our neighbors by inviting them in for a meal and yet give them ample space at the same time?

More importantly, how do we convert our abstract questions and considerations and apply them more concretely? Maybe it starts by exploring new ways to serve with those among us who have recently joined. Perhaps it has to do with branching out a bit more, getting to know and care for the generations of our church beyond our own. I'm not sure where to start, but I'm betting you have plenty of thoughts and some good ideas. Maybe some of them will fruitfully manifest.

So as we wander through this messy month of dichotomous division, let us carry these meditations with us. It is my hope in doing so that we find peace, comfort, and a sense of belonging to the Lord and each other in a time where such relation remains a rare and precious commodity.



STEWARDSHIP MONTH MOVES INTO BUDGET MONTH

THANK YOU to each member and family who has taken the time to prayerfully consider a financial response to this year's stewardship campaign. Your faithful support helps me, as the Business Administrator work with the Finance Committee



and Session to prepare the 2025 Budget.

Committees have been looking ahead to next year as to what could be offered in areas of Christian Education, Membership, Church Activities, meaningful Worship Activities, and Mission Outreach.

It is inspiring to work with these creative leaders as they dream of ideas for our church and how we can become better Christians individually and together as our Church becomes what God is asking of us.

I encourage you to pray for the Session members, our Deacons, committee members, volunteers, and staff. Our church is fortunate to have so many committed people who offer so many talents and give their time freely.

NEW LANDSCAPING AND TREES

The Building and Grounds Committee has contracted with Mulhall's to design and plant the landscaped areas surrounding the Welcome Center. We have arranged to have our sprinkler system expanded to include drip hoses in these areas to give our new fall plantings a boost.

New trees have also been added to the east side of our property. One will be planted to the east of the Hearth Room. Then a few more will be added along the connecting drive to add to our beautiful, wooded area. There will be plenty of green space for our youth to play and for concerts to be held.

Children and Youth Giving

All last month, I challenged our children and youth to meet a \$240 goal by year end to provide a

beekeeping opportunity for a farmer. And they have met it, twice.

Simply have your child write their name on a blue envelope each



Sunday with their offering to have their gift counted towards this effort. Bees help crops — and income — grow. In parts of the world where harvesting a seasonal crop might not provide enough money to live on all year, beekeeping can help farmers supplement their earnings. In Guatemala, for example, farmers earn 23% more each month by selling honey. Provide positive change for a village by contributing to the installation and management of beehives.

Dumitru Roibu is Executive President of YMCA Moldova. His history of YMCA community service includes roles such as World YMCA Youth Empowerment assistant and YMCA Change Agent (a global leadership program), and participation in YES (Youth Engagement in Sports) and TTT

(Training The Trainers) seminars.

Dumitru Roibu (Dima) was a big success for all those involved! During Dima's five days with us, he made his presentation about his work in Moldova to five churches in the Presbytery, and was well-received everywhere. He presented to small groups of very interested people at New Life Presbyterian Church, Presbyterian Church of the Master, Discovery Church (all in Omaha), and Westminster Church in Clarinda, Iowa.

At Presbyterian Church of the Cross in Omaha, he spoke in two worship services, met with Junior and Senior High youth, and gave his full presentation at a congregational luncheon for 80 attendees. In every case, he was well-received, answered lots of questions, and captivated and inspired every audience.

In addition to church appearances, we took him to meet Executive Directors of Immigrant Legal Center, Omaha Street School, NorthStar, YMCA of Greater Omaha, and Dr. Nicolai Roddy at Creighton University. He enjoyed every conversation and soaked up information like a sponge. Dima also attended the Voices for Children Gala with some of our team members and was very interested in seeing an example of American fund-raising methods. He was even fascinated by the Iowa and Nebraska countryside on the way to Clarinda! After a farewell dinner on Sunday evening – a Slavic feast hosted by our Associate Pastor – Dima flew to St. George, Utah, for his final visit on his International Peacemaker itinerary.

Dima's innovation and passion is an inspiration to us all. His presence had a positive impact on our church and community as together we worked for peace and justice.

Dima is now home in Maldova and sends his gratitude and thanks to all for his visit to Omaha.

Agape Book Review

Continuation of....Stamped from the Beginning: The Definitive History of Racist Ideas in America, by Dr. Ibram Kendi

As I continue to read this book, it becomes apparent that no matter what Black people do to try to please White people, justifiably resist White people, make progress, improve themselves, or educate themselves, they are actively resisted by White people. As Kendi reviews US history from the decade before and during the Civil War, he describes the fact that Lincoln, when running for office for an Illinois Senate seat in 1854, stated his purpose was "to free all the slaves and send them to Liberia." His reasoning was "to keep them among us as underlings" was not an acceptable option. After the war he emancipated 50,000 slaves in some of the Confederate states; Lincoln could not (and did not) emancipate another 500,000 million slaves in bordering confederate states, because he would have lost the loyalty of their owners. From then on it was up to the slaves to escape on their own to the Union states to obtain their freedom. At another point in the Civil War, Lincoln requests that a Black Regiment be formed, thereby giving these black soldiers a reason to believe they could earn their citizenship. At the end of the war thousands of the Regiment had been killed and they too had killed thousands of Confederate soldiers. Ironically after the war members of the Black Regiment were viewed as "docile enough" to take orders, while at the same time being "uncontrollable brutes"and "brutal killers." White soldiers complained because they had to serve "shoulder to shoulder" with these "seething, sooty negroes." At the end of the war, the "Cincinnati Enquirer" announced "Slavery is dead; the negro is not. There is our misfortune." A few days later, John Wilkes Booth commented "That means ncitizenship." And a short time later, Lincoln was assassinated in Ford's Theatre. As Blacks migrated north to seek freedom, they were regarded as being idle criminals. As they arrived in the cities and were working hard at resisting discrimination, building churches and schools, and striving for economic security, they merely infuriated the southern White population. Their presence was used by Whites to justify lynching and widespread violence. White Southerners wanted to be free from the "semi-barbarous "Black voters who "longed to subject their White women to their unbridled lust." And this is only the beginning of the struggle for human rights and dignity for Blacks in America. I will be honest: This has been a very challenging book report to write. The author packs in so much critical and essential information about Black History in America that it is difficult to reduce it to a few simple paragraphs. There will be a third (and final) report on this book for December. It will encompass the last third of the book.

We have so much to learn.
