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The New Year

For better or worse, I’ve been thinking a lot about the New Year and January; particularly, what they mean for us philosophically and theologically. All this thinking has led me to two conclusions: first, I think far too much about the human-constructed notion(s) of time (seconds, hours, days, months, years, silly-but-important-things like the international date-line) and what it means for us to live in the midst of such a construction; second, January is the month of/for concretization.

Let me explain...

Concretize (verb [with an object]) – make (an idea or concept) real; give specific form to.

Taken from the New Oxford American Dictionary

What I mean by concretization in the context of our faith and how it relates to the month of January and New Years thematically is this... we are supposed to reflect on the process of how the nonembodied things of our faith became embodied in Jesus Christ; with Christ as our example, the unembodied is supposed to continue to become embodied. Simply, our spiritual longing is also supposed to be given a materialized form.

Let me explain further... Stick with me...

Think about it. Spiritually, we go through Advent doing our best to let abide within our hearts those most precious of soulful and intellectual abstractions: hope, peace, joy, and love. We carry them intentionally for days and weeks; for days and weeks we are called to meditate on them. And then, on Christmas morning, we pay homage to the time in which hope, peace, joy, and love came to full fruition in their manifest form, in the form of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

When Jesus comes into the picture, those nonembodied things, the notions of hope, peace, joy, and love, essentially formless in and of themselves, are suddenly given a body. They become concretized. Think of when John wrote about the Word becoming flesh. This is what I mean, this is the example that Christ gives us.

So what’re we supposed to do with this notion of concretization in a practical sense? We’re supposed to follow Christ’s example further. We’re supposed to consider the great things written upon our hearts and souls and give them a physical form – we may not be very Christ-like in comparison to his ministry

but we are all called to a particular ministerial vocations of great dignity nonetheless (such as hospitality, mission, education, etc.).

January then is supposed to be the time when the things of the soul become realized. January is a time to consider what it is that God is calling you to do: what is the new thing in my life that God is nudging me towards? Perhaps some of us feel compelled to venture out into previously unexplored sectors of our faith. Perhaps some of us have overextended ourselves and need to consider the lilies of the field. There’s too many “perhaps” to name, but now is the time to sit with such things... and then do them once we know what they are. Whatever it is that God is calling you to do or be in the new days of this new year... may you cherish the times we have been given to wonder... and embody the call we have been given.

The View from My Office

LET'S START AN ADVENTURE TOGETHER

As the new year begins, have you thought about starting an adventure in reading? I have and I thought it might be encouraging if some of YOU might join me this year. Let's make 2025 the Year we sat down and read the Bible – together. I expect we will find a series of foreign cultures, spread across many centuries, with customs and expectations that will seem very different from what I am accustomed to.

Some things may sound familiar – for example, “Love your neighbor as yourself” – but many others will seem quite unusual and foreign, such as the ritual and food laws of the early Old Testament. Regardless, as we settle into this “strange new world,” let's find the insights and riches in abundance for living in the world which we inhabit today.

JANUARY

In the Old Testament, it looks like we will mostly read from the book of Genesis. As the first words, “In the beginning,” suggest, Genesis gives us the basic setting for the people of Israel.

In the New Testament, we will be reading the Gospel of Matthew. You may not know that, while Matthew appears first in the New Testament, it was probably written after Mark. Nearly all scholars believe that Matthew and Luke used Mark as they wrote their Gospels. All three of these Gospels give a sequential account of Jesus' life. Matthews story about Jesus is straightforward.

Did you know that we have some talented writers in our congregation and that some of their books are in the church library? This write-up will feature three authors of children's and young adult nonfiction.

- Gayle Kerr-McFadden has written FOLLOW THE STAR: A CHRISTMAS STORY. This book is a very simple retelling of the first Christmas. The ending links our Christmas customs to the Biblical story. Graphic design artwork is by MUJKA. The book is in the children's nonfiction section (Dewey #232) with black tape on the spine.

- In that same section is Bidong Y Tot's book A BOY IN AKOBE, SOUTH SUDAN. Bidong tells his own story of a day in the life of a boy raised in Akobe, South Sudan where he was born. The appealing artwork is by Jaqueline Lopez-Regel. Children will respond to the simple story line and accompanying illustrations. (Dewey #232— black tape on spine).

- THE DUNEHAVEN COUNCIL by Patty Ritchie traces the seasons of the year in the lives of animal residents in a woodland community. They meet in their Dunehaven Council quarterly to share stories and concerns; there they meet two curious children and talk together about the problems and challenges they face. The children are able to communicate with the animals and work with them to find solutions to problems in their shared world. Patty is not only the author, but she has done her own watercolor illustrations. This book is found in the youth nonfiction section (Dewey #574.5). There is a second copy in the adult nonfiction section.

You're invited to check out these books and maybe talk with the authors about them. The next time a library article appears, it will feature our talented authors of adult books.
