



The play covers the final period of Jesus' life from his visit to Jerusalem to the journey to the cross. This study helps readers feel a sense of connection to the play while recognizing their own place in the story of Jesus."

The Lenten Study is a great opportunity to get to know others in our church family while preparing for Easter. We hope you will join us!


Friday Night Gourmet on March 14

Youth Offering Goals Set for 2025!

In the Gathering Space where the elementary children gather for Sunday School each week, there are goal sheets posted displaying this year's giving effort. To kick off 2025, their first goal is to raise enough money to purchase two sets of 2 Rabbits and a Hutch, which costs \$100 per set. Rabbits reproduce at a very high rate and can be a consistent source of nutrition for a family in need.

During January and the first part of February, our children and youth have already given \$66 towards this effort. WAY TO GO MIGHTY KIDS! Once they have reached their first goal, their next effort is to raise enough money to purchase fishing equipment and supplies. This is another way for a family to improve their livlihood and become more self-sufficient. Presbyterian Disaster Aid for the Ongoing California Fires - Matching Grant from the Mission Committee

Please support the crucial work of Presbyterian Disaster Assistance as they support the presbyteries and communities impacted by the disastrous ongoing fires in California. Tens of thousands of residents have been forced to evacuate and more than 57,000 homes are threatened.



Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is in communication with the affected presbyteries to offer resources in the aftermath of the fires. So far, we are aware of one Presbyterian church destroyed (Pacific Palisades Presbyterian Church) and several more are threatened. We will know more once the fires are contained and evacuation orders have been lifted. Pray for those affected, and for the safety, strength and resilience of the first responders battling these historic blazes, and for the families and communities devastated by unimaginable loss.

You may donate online at churchofthecrossomaha.org by clicking on the Giving button, then selecting Disaster Relief from the drop-down menu, or via our blue pew envelopes, or send checks to PCOC designating PDA in the memo. Presbyterian Church of the Cross members have given more than \$5,100 this year and the Mission Committee is matching another \$5,000.
