



The Year of the Bible

I urge everyone to join in these exciting chapters and learn from Solomon's decisions.



Then, 1 Corinthians contains a completing witness to the hope and assurance that Christ's resurrection offers. If you are wondering about your faith, if you feel a questioning tug within you about whether faith in God really makes sense, read Chapter 15 again and again.
